



New Holland second grade student Anthony Argueta Yebra has reached quite a milestone in just five months. He's read over 1 million words! Since September, Anthony has read 132 books, which also translates into 1,092,345 words.

This year New Holland has begun keeping track of the amount of words each child reads through the Accelerated Reader software. Accelerated Reader allows students to take a knowledge-based test about the book that they read to check their comprehension. If they pass the test, they are given credit for the number of words in the book. Each month, the top readers (students with the highest word count) from each grade level are rewarded with free books, breakfast, or a prize of their choice.

Anthony's teacher, Ms. Cynthia Kinsey, believes that Anthony's passion for reading has encouraged the rest of her class to adopt a love for books. Ms. Kinsey says, "Anthony loves reading and often tells his classmates that reading is one of his favorite hobbies. Anthony enjoys all kinds of books, but some of his favorites include Diary of a Wimpy Kid, Captain Underpants and Judy Moody books. Anthony's passion for reading has also encouraged his classmates to join the competition, and many of them are well on their way to achieving the 350,000 words read challenge for our class."

This will be quite a task for students at New Holland, but they are willing and ready to read!
